



Kent's Cap

He goes to ask for help.




Quinn did not get lost. She had luck in the men's part of Big Mart.

Kwanzaa Fun Facts (Background Information)

Kwanzaa is a celebration of African culture that lasts for seven days, beginning on December 26.

Kwanzaa was created as an annual holiday for African Americans to celebrate and share their heritage and values of family, unity, creativity, and faith.

Red, green, and black are used to decorate for this holiday.

Clothing worn during Kwanzaa reflects traditional African garb such as long robes or wraps (kaftan) for women and caps (kufi) and colorful long shirts (dashiki) for men.

A kinara holds seven candles: three green, one black, and three red. Each day during Kwanzaa a new candle is lit.

On January 1st, the last day of Kwanzaa, families exchange homemade gifts (zawadi).
